COMMUNITY NEED

19,384 residents in Schenectady County live below the federal poverty level

SERVICES

SCAP's comprehensive services helped 7,000+ people in Schenectady County

CHILDREN'S HEALTH

- 310 received medical exams
- 286 received dental care
- 323 received developmental screenings

HOUSING STABILITY

98.5% of clients receiving our housing services maintain stable housing, preventing homelessness

RENTAL ASSISTANCE

\$939,834 provided in rental assistance to prevent homelessness

Early Learning Enrollment

295 children enrolled in SCAP's Head Start and Early Head Start-Child Care Partnership programs



REENTRY SERVICES

Customers in our reentry services achieved a recidivism rate of only 11.4%, compared to the NYS rate of 19.1%

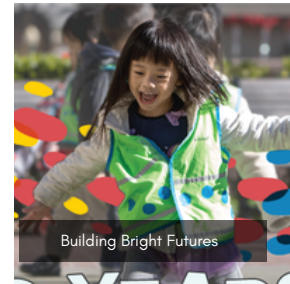
EMERGENCY FUND

327 individuals in crisis received financial support to meet immediate needs for housing, utilities, medical care, and essential services



SOJOURN HOUSE

76 individuals found safety at Sojourn House in 2025, including 37 women and 39 children



FOOD SECURITY

84,233 nutritious meals served and 94 children received free formula

COMMUNITY RESOURCE NETWORK

1,222 households served through comprehensive support services, including eviction counseling, tenant-landlord mediation, housing assistance, case management, assistance with applications for public assistance (SNAP, HEAP, SSI/SSDI), and referrals for food/clothing

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

Direct support provided to 36 individuals. 26 received ongoing therapeutic support (347 sessions). 10 onsite received crisis intervention.

EMPLOYMENT

95 Individuals gained employment or developed employability skills

A FAMILY'S STORY

Jennifer Lockwood describes the moment she first contacted SCAP as "a God wink type of thing - angels fell out of the sky, exactly when we needed them." For years, she and her husband Jay had fought to advocate for their son CJ, who has social pragmatic communication disorder, ADHD, anxiety, and significant visual deficits. Despite their persistence, a school system in Schenectady County continued to treat CJ as a behavioral problem rather than a child who needed support. During his freshman year of high school, the situation reached a breaking point.



Through Project LAUNCH, Jennifer connected with SCAP's ELP Community Services Coordinator. For the first time, the family felt heard. SCAP staff educated them on their rights under the ADA and civil rights laws, helped file formal complaints with the state, connected them with SCAP's Behavioral Health Services, and ultimately helped secure an appropriate educational placement for CJ at BOCES.

The results speak for themselves. CJ not only graduated from high school - he walked across the stage. He has since started his first job, enrolled in a college program designed to support students like him, and learned to advocate for himself and others. "He learned that he wasn't broken," Jennifer says, "and that just because he thinks differently than other people, it doesn't mean he shouldn't have a right to learn the way he needs to learn."

Jennifer's advice to other families is straightforward: "I just wish more parents knew that they had the right to get an advocate. Once we did, it totally changed everything for CJ."

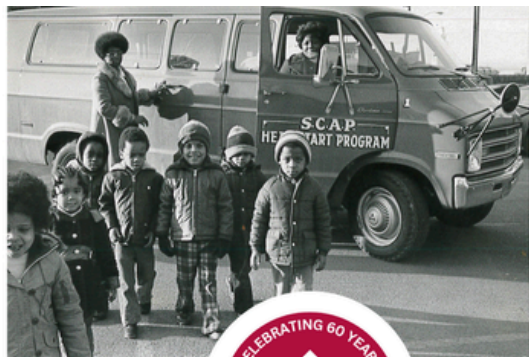
